CHAPTER 15. "Of Repentance unto Life and Salvation"

Repentance is a change of heart that results in a change of behavior. The desire and power to repent is from God. Repentance is necessary. Repentance is not penance.

- I. Paragraph 1: Effectually called to repentance
 - A. God enables those He saves later in life to repent of their sinful habits.
- II. Paragraph 2: Good news for the backslidden
 - A. Believers can fall into sin and backslide, but be renewed through repentance.
- III. Paragraph 3: Repentance described
 - A. Repentance is an evangelical grace (i.e., it is not of ourselves).
 - B. The Holy Spirit reveals the sin to the regenerate mind.
 - 1. Holy Spirit conviction produces Godly sorrow
 - a. Godly sorrow is deeper than simple guilt or regret.
 - 2. Holy Spirit conviction produces a hatred of sin.
 - C. Repentance is humble not arrogant.
 - D. Repentance produces prayers for forgiveness, power to change, and a Godly resolve.
 - E. The repentant soul lives to please God.
- IV. Paragraph 4: Repentance, a duty
 - A. Due to remaining sin, repentance is a way of life for believers.
 - B. Unbelievers are under the command of God to repent.
 - C. Some of our sins are particularly known by us (and possibly others) and we are to pay particular attention to deal with these.
- V. Paragraph 5: Repentance preached
 - A. Whether small or great, all known sins should be repented of.
 - B. Repentance should be preached and taught as a constant reminder of our need to repent.
